Scenario guidelines — Beautiful bathrooms

Dave is the owner of Beautiful Bathrooms, which he founded ten years ago. The company provides great bathrooms that suit people's needs and personalities, whatever their budget!


He has four new customers who all want a new bathroom. Dave wants you, his new design team, to come up with the right bathroom for the right customer, and to tell him how much it will cost.

You must remember that this is how much it will cost Dave to buy all the parts from his supplier. He always adds on a percentage for his own profits. Of course, he has to charge for the person-power to do the work. How else would you get paid?



Rules for designing and planning

- First and foremost, make sure you give the customers what they want!
- All rooms are 3m high.
- All sinks are 40cm wide, 50cm deep and 75cm high.
- All bathtubs are 200cm long, 70cm wide and 50cm high.
- All showers have a 1m² base and are 2.5m high.
- All toilets are 55cm deep, 35cm wide and 75cm high.
- Showers must go in a corner, and must have tiles behind them.
- Toilets must go against a wall and have Im² of free floor area around them.
- You must not put flooring under a shower.
- Toilets and baths do not have to have tiles behind them otherwise you can put tiles anywhere you want.



- Tiles do not have to go higher than 40cm above the top of a sink, bath or shower.
- Ceilings should only be painted.
- All doors are Im wide and 2m high, and must be painted.
- Don't worry about windows or lights. They will be sorted out separately.

Presenting your work

- Draw a plan of your proposed bathroom layout: a separate plan for each wall and the floor.
- Show all calculations neatly in separate areas.
- You must show an overall cost for all the equipment and materials.

Calculating profits and labour costs

 If you move on to preparing the actual customer estimates, Dave simply adds 10% on to all costs. To calculate costs of workers to fit the bathroom, use the information about personpower. Remember that profit for Dave does not include his staff's wages.
